Best Home-Design Trends

The American Institute of Architects recently conducted a survey to find out which features clients are asking architects for. We were intrigued by the survey results largely because they match the amenities included in our stock home plans. On the following pages, we highlight the most-requested special-function rooms.

Home Office

Topping the list of home-design trends is the home office. Rising gas prices and the increased ease of telecommuting have made home offices a necessity. But whether you are a full-time telecommuter or run your own business, a dedicated office gives you a quiet, professional haven in your home.

Your home office should give you the comfort and privacy to succeed at your tasks, whether it's making cold calls or writing a report. Think about where the room is situated in the home. If clients visit you, positioning your office in the front of your home will allow you to maintain privacy for conducting business, and will decrease the risk of your guest tripping over an abandoned toy or spying household clutter.

Taking the hobby room to a new level, this activity area features large, bright windows and doors that will illuminate any task. Well-placed storage protects tools and supplies, while keeping them close at hand ready to use.

Custom bookcases and cabinets are an attractive way to display objects or reference books (the "tools of your trade"), as well as conceal unsightly computer equipment and cables. Control your paperwork, such as contracts, reports and brochures or catalogs, with built-in filing cabinets. Well-placed windows can provide natural lighting that elevates your mood and makes the site of sometimes-difficult tasks easier to swallow, while promoting creativity and increasing productivity.

Hobby Room

Crafting is hot! Creative activities such as knitting, sewing, scrapbooking, beading, quilting—even rug hooking—are making a comeback. Timeless pursuits, like stamp collecting or electric trains, are popular ways to socialize with friends or family or relieve stress. No matter which hobby you've taken up, one thing is true: They all come with a ton of equipment. A hobby room gives you space to spread out your supplies and work in comfort. To that end, make sure you have counters or workbenches built to give you a large work surface. You'll also appreciate cabinets for storing bolts of fabric and drawers for keeping delicate, decorative papers. Install high-quality lighting for fine-detail work and a sink for clean-up. Game Room

If your childhood "rec" room was anything like mine, it was an afterthought, located in a dark, dank basement with plywood paneling on the walls and carpet remnants on the floor. By comparison, more careful consideration is being given to today's game room. As more people are frequently entertaining in their homes, they're looking for a comfortable, flexible space where they can unwind and have fun with their family and friends. Whether your children play board games here or dad hosts his weekly poker night, you can get extra mileage out of the room by installing a wet bar or refrigerator for storing refreshments, comfortable seating and perhaps a bath.

- Siding. Brick, vinyl and new fiber cement siding—all have longer staying power than wood.
- Decking. Environmentally friendly, composite deck materials don't warp, splinter or rot.
- Countertops. Compressed composites that mimic popular and expensive natural stone are durable, heat resistant and affordable.
- Flooring. Laminates (including hardwood), concrete and bamboo are popular, attractive and easy-to-maintain flooring alternatives.

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Laundry Room

Now that your basement has been given over to entertainment, the washer and dryer have found a place to reside in the laundry room. Featuring new high-end appliances in a wide range of colors, laundry rooms may be conveniently located off the kitchen where you might find yourself doing other chores. Or, if it better suits your lifestyle, the laundry room can be situated on your home's second floor near the bedrooms and bathrooms where most laundry is generated. Today's laundry room features wall-mounted shelves and cabinets for storing detergent and bleach. Built-in ironing boards are also popular, saving space by folding into a cabinet when not in use. This is another room where adequate lighting makes your task more pleasant—spotting stains or ironing collars has never been easier.
